Biography of Speaker

Gerry Pankonin has lived in Perkins County most of her life where she attended country grade school and graduated in 1939 from Perkins County High School.

She has been married to Elmer Pankonin since November 1941. The couple's children include sons Larry and Leon who farm in the county. In 1978 they lost their daughter, Linda, a registered nurse, in a tragic tractor-car accident.

Pankonin worked at the A.S.C. office in Imperial for two years and was employed at Sullivan/Aten Department Store in Grant for 30 years.

She served as a member of the Grant Planning Commission and the Grant Cemetery Board.

For 30 years, she taught pre-school Sunday School at Zion Lutheran Church.

Since the age of 18, through her father's honor, she has been a member of the American Legion Auxiliary and V.F.W. She is a member of Sawyer Club.

"Veterans and servicemen and women are special to me since daddy was in World War I," said Pankonin. Her husband Elmer was in World War II, and her brother, two brothers-in-law and two grandsons have also served.

"Patriotism is my number one interest," Pankonin said.

With the blessing of the American Legion Auxiliary, she started "Avenue of Flags" at the local

cemetery in 1984. There are now 182 flags.
