With help from a grant, along with donations from area residents, the new ultrasound machine at Perkins County Health Services is in place and in use.

Ron Patrick, administrator for the Perkins County Health Services Foundation, led the effort in raising funds for the new equipment, in operation since mid-August, which enhances diagnostic capabilities at the Grant Medical Clinic.

The project toward purchase of the \$25,000 piece of medical equipment began the middle of May. A recent grant for \$1,500 from the Mid-Nebraska Community Foundation of North Platte was added to funds from 31 donors to the PCHS Foundation, fulfilling the required amount for purchase.

Dr. Kristi Kohl applauds the project. "This machine will provide benefit in the clinic for rapid diagnosis and prognosis in pregnancies and in emergency cases, such as bladder cases," she said. "It will be available for use by all the community medical providers, not only by us in the Grant Medical Clinic."
